This year was marked by the pandemic and was a difficult one that has posed serious challenges to society. For this reason, from the very beginning of the health crisis, Fundación Cepsa's efforts were channeled in particular into helping alleviate the consequences of COVID-19, especially among the most vulnerable groups. We made numerous contributions, both financial and in kind, including supplying hygiene products to vulnerable families and donating almost 500,000 kilos of food to the Spanish Federation of Food Banks.

Although this year, because of these exceptional circumstances, we prioritized social support initiatives, promoting environmental and scientific and educational initiatives still form the other two pillars of our activity.

Fundación Cepsa seeks to provide solutions to the extraordinary stage through which the energy sector is passing, through actions that contribute to ecological transition and progress. We will therefore continue to promote projects to protect biodiversity and the environment and to collaborate with research programs through the chairs at different Spanish universities, in addition to implementing initiatives that promote employability in the energy sector.

Lastly, I would like to highlight our collaboration with different social entities, government agencies, and educational centers, which strengthen our role as an agent of social transformation and make it possible for us to continue improving the quality of life of people and our communities.

1.2. WE ARE COMMITTED TO TRANSPARENCY

At Fundación Cepsa, we defend good corporate governance and regulatory compliance. In 2017, we approved our Code of Ethics and Conduct, which sets out the guidelines and ways of acting that the members of the Board of Trustees and the Foundation's team, and any other person or organization that has relations with the Foundation, must respect. In addition, we have an Ethics and Compliance Channel, for reporting any irregular conduct that deviates from the behaviors established in the Code of Ethics and Conduct.

We also strive to ensure that suppliers, the organizations assisted, and all those who collaborate with the Foundation adhere to the Code as a sign of our willingness to act in a transparent and responsible manner. The Code of Ethics and Conduct is available on our website, together with the Foundation's annual reports,

annual financial statements, and action plans, as an example of our desire to make transparency a hallmark of the Foundation's identity, on which we are continuing to make progress.

In 2020, we worked hard to improve our reporting system so as to evaluate and maximize our impact by developing a model for monitoring activities and collaborations that allows us to estimate the number of beneficiaries of actions of different types in a homogeneous, rigorous, and valid manner. This methodology was developed in collaboration with a consulting firm and was applied for the first time in this report. We intend to refine this system in the coming years, so as to be able to better gage our impact and transparency.



3. KEY ACTION LINES

3.1. SOCIAL SUPPORT

Two of our most significant and long-standing initiatives are in the area of social action: the Social Value Awards and the *Voluntas*volunteer program. In addition to improving these two projects, in this area, we aim to strengthen our role as an agent of social transformation by prioritizing projects that improve the quality of life of the most disadvantaged groups and promoting the development of local communities.



RESPONSE TO COVID-19

The pandemic caused by COVID-19 has had significant repercussions on society: it has increased needs in areas as varied as healthcare, food, the digital divide, and situations of loneliness and generalized anxiety. Fundación Cepsa has not remained indifferent to this crisis, and many of the activities and collaborations in 2020 were reoriented to meet the needsthat arose in this new context.

DONATIONS TO FOOD BANKS

In addition to these donations, we organized a campaign aimed at Cepsa professionals in Spain encouraging them to donate to FESBAL, and some 500 workers took part, donating more than $\[\in \]$ 63,000.



COLLABORATION WITH MEDICAL TRANSPORT FOR PEOPLE AFFECTED BY COVID-19


Another of the needs that has arisen out of COVID-19 is the transportation of people affected by the disease to health centers and, in Spain, our response to this need was to donate fuel cards worth € 75,000 to the Red Cross and the appropriate government agencies in Madrid, Huelva, and Campo de Gibraltar. In Portugal, we are carrying out the same action with two social organizations that respond to this demand.

DONATION OF MEDICAL SUPPLIES

Another action we sponsored to respond to the needs of the health system were donations and deliveries of medicines and other medical supplies (gloves, hand sanitizer, masks, surgical gowns and caps, etc.) to public health services located in our areas of intervention in Algeria and Colombia.

DONATION OF DETERGENT TO VULNERABLE FAMILIES

We reached a major agreement with Fundación Persán to jointly donate 180 tons of laundry soap and home care detergents to vulnerable families as a way of lightening the cost of their shopping baskets. This donation is channeled through the associative network and with the involvement of the local social services in Seville, Huelva, and Campo de Gibraltar.





VOLUNTEERING

The restrictions imposed by COVID-19 prevented us from carrying out many of the volunteer activities with which we usually collaborate but we adapted by collaborating remotely through telephone calls, letters, or on the Internet. These activities were aimed at elderly or sick people, thanks to our collaboration with Adopta un Abuelo, Nadie Solo, Cruz Roja, Cáritas, and Iniciativas Humanas, and we also collaborated in storytelling for hospitalized children with Fundación Theodora.

In addition to these activities, Cepsa employees took part in virtual races, such as the one organized by Down Madrid and the Carrera de las Capacidades (Abilities Race) with Fundación Adecco.

SOCIAL VALUE AWARDS

As non-profits are playing a key role in mitigating the consequences of COVID-19, we are making a further endowment to the 2020 Social Value Awards of € 100,000, making them € 500,000 overall. In addition, in each of the seven areas in which the Awards are organized (Madrid, Huelva, Campo de Gibraltar, Canary Islands, Brazil, Colombia, and Portugal), at least one of the projects selected has been designed to mitigate the effects of COVID-19.



The Social Value Awards are our most well-established initiative. Their goal is to improve the welfare of vulnerable people in Madrid, Huelva, Campo de Gibraltar, the Canary Islands, Brazil, Colombia, and Portugal through financial contributions to projects implemented by non-profit organizations. In 2020, we celebrated the 16th edition of these awards and beat the record number of applications received, with 435 nominations submitted.

- **AFEMEN** Social integration of people with mental disorders, by facilitating their recovery through training, cultural, occupational, sports, leisure, and free-time activities.
- **Nuevo Hogar Betania.** A day center for homeless people in Algeciras where leisure and the bond of belonging are used as tools for the social integration of this vulnerable group.
- Vincentian Family Association (AFAVI) "Aula en Red" (Online Classroom). Socio-educational care for children and adolescents who have been expelled from school to prevent risk situations and juvenile delinquency.

- Breast Cancer Patient and Family Association (BANDERA ROSA) "La Mochila Rosa" (The Pink Backpack). A pink backpack with turbans, post-surgery bra, hand sanitizer, and masks are offered to breast cancer patients.
- Association of Adolescents and Children at Risk of Social Exclusion (AIRES) "AIRES Te Conecta" (AIRES Connects You). Support for vulnerable families and children in the use of digital platforms to reduce the digital gap in access to basic services.



CANARY ISLANDS



- **AFEDES Association** "AFEDES a tu lado" (AFEDES at your side). Support for vulnerable people with empowerment workshops, strengthening of support networks, coverage of basic needs, and computer literacy.
- Canary Islands Asperger's Association (AsperCan) "ResetEA". Its aim is to promote the inclusion of people with Asperger's through guides for teachers and companies, and talks and training in schools and companies.
- Breast Cancer Association of Tenerife (AMATE) Psychosocial counseling, assistance, and information for people with breast cancer and their families, and workshops on the early detection of breast cancer.
- Mental Health Association (ATELSAM) "Finca Isora: Prepara y Emplea" (Prepare and Employ). Improvement of the employment situation of people with mental disorders through organic farming and a poultry farm.

• Canary Islands Foundation for the Deaf and their Families (FUNCASOR) Specialized speech therapy for the hearing impaired through auditory-verbal therapy and intervention with the family, who are taught to encourage speech expression.



COLOMBIA



- Good Seed Foundation. Construction of a kitchen, dining room, and bathrooms for the tutoring, art, music, and sports center "Casa Buena Semilla", which serves 80 vulnerable children in the Egipto neighborhood of Bogota.
- Fundación Planeta Amor (Planet Love). Nutritional security for mothers with HIV and their families through good food practices, preparation of healthy diets, and promotion of organic urban farms.
- ICAL Foundation for the Deaf Child. Its aim is to strengthen the technological skills of teachers and young people (hearing impaired) so that students can continue their education successfully.
- Children of the Sierra Flor Foundation (FHSF). Seeks to build a sustainable agricultural production and marketing model that generates higher incomes and leads to the empowerment of women and their families in the rural environment.

- Bella Flor Foundation (FBF). "ViveArte en Bella" (LiveArt in Bella). Using successful experiences based on artistic initiatives, it develops the abilities of children in the Paraíso and Bella Flor neighborhoods in Ciudad Bolívar.
- Foundation for Sustainable, Alternative, and Integral Development of Sucre (INTEGRASUCRE). "CINERGIA" (Cynergy). This project seeks to bolster the audiovisual techniques and management of 15 young people, victims of the armed conflict and gender violence, who present an itinerant theater and cinema program.
- We Believe in You Association. Support is provided to minors who are victims of sexual violence through online consultations, by means of the purchase of computers and network provision so that they attend these consultations remotely.

PORTUGAL



- Inclusion for the Handicapped (BIPP) "Sembrar el empleo" (Sowing the seeds of employment). Training and integration into the labor market of young people and adults with intellectual disabilities through organic agriculture.
- Fundação Salesianos IPSS (Salesians of Évora). "Madres Brillantes" (Brilliant Mothers). Empowerment of vulnerable female heads of household through social support, development of their personal skills, and training for access to the labor market.
- National Association for the Support of Development, Research and Community (ANADIC). "Brigada de la Tercera Edad" (Third Age Brigade). Mobilizing seniors by responding to their needs to leave their homes and manage their budget, and promoting active aging through volunteering.



- Associação Aprender em Parceria (A PAR) "One house, many families". Assists families with basic socioeducational skills to improve parent-child interactions and promote access to education.
- Associação Serve the City Portugal (STC). "Academy of Change". Empowerment and encouragement of homeless people through new learning pathways that will increase their inclusion, using an innovative methodology.

BRAZIL





- Instituto de Cegos da Bahia (ICB) "ImaginaSom" (ImagineSound"). Music center for musical, educational, and cultural activities with visually impaired people, also open to their families and the community.
- Lar Santa Maria (LSM) Sport as a way to overcome the difficulties imposed by the Covid-19 pandemic and contribute to the overall development and collaborative work of children and teenagers in the town of Itiúba.
- Associação Vivo Feliz Support for the Fight against Childhood Cancer (ACCI) Digital access to music classes for children and adolescents with neoplasia, together with psychosocial support, and training and employability workshops.
- Grupo de Apoio à Criança com Câncer Bahia (GACC-BA) "Laboratório de la Esperança" (Laboratory of Hope). Economic sustainability of the organization through a new PCR analysis activity for COVID-19 that requires replacing two pieces of equipment in the laboratory.
- Projeto Crianças da Vila Social (Social Town Children's Project). Professional training for young people and adults through robotics and cell phone maintenance workshops, plus support for a day care center and indoor soccer classes.

SPECIAL EMPLOYEE AWARD

In addition to the projects we selected in the different locations in which we sponsor the Social Value Awards, with the collaboration of local juries, we chose other

projects based on votes from Cepsa employees and, in 2020, we promoted the following five projects:

Fighting for Alzheimer's patients - AFA CAMINAR Huelva	"Promoviendo el bienestar" (Promoting Wellness). Addressing Alzheimer's by stimulating the parts of the brain that are impaired and helping families respond to different situations.
Fundación Niños de los Andes (Children of the Andes Foundation) Colombia	The aim is to design and implement a Community of Practice model Learning to meet the challenges of virtual education for the 400 students fostered by the Foundation.
Fundación Nacional Batuta Colombia	"Red Coral Juvenil del Bicentenario" (Bicentennial Youth Choir Network). Training and support for 200 children and young people from Venezuela and Colombia to celebrate the Bicentennial of the Constitution of Cúcuta, by performing works by composers from both countries.
SOS Children's Villages Brazil	"Connecting with the future." Promoting the autonomy of vulnerable adolescents in Camaçari through weekly meetings on ethics, socialemotional skills, training, etc.
Junior Achievement Bahia Brazil	"Entrepreneurial Trajectory - Driving Valuable Futures". Training project for at-risk elementary and high school students in financial education, and personal and work planning.



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

In this line of work, we promote projects in Cepsa's areas of interest in Colombia and Peru with which we seek to contribute to the socioeconomic advancement of these

areas through initiatives to provide infrastructure, training, and income generation to local communities.







In Caracara (Colombia), we supported Productive Farmer Projects through investments that promote good practices in livestock and fish farming, the transformation of products for their commercialization in monthly markets, and we collaborated in the development of family life plans. We also supported the municipality of Puerto Gaitán and the Government of Meta by participating in the municipal and departmental development plans and, in 2020, we provided training and support to local producer associations to adapt their work standards to COVID 19 regulations.

In Casanare (Colombia), we collaborated in the municipal development plans of the Llanos 22, Jilguero, and Puntero blocks and, in 2020, we provided resources for municipal facilities such as swimming pools and sports fields, delivered food parcels to the vulnerable population, and health and protective materials to local hospital staff.

In the regions of Huánuco and Ucayali (Peru), we promoted initiatives to improve the local road network, which was severely damaged by the rainy season, and projects to

improve community infrastructure, such as mothers' clubs, glass of milk clubs, soup kitchens, etc., and in 2020, we collaborated in the construction of the PRONOEI Center with the aim of extending education to children under six years of age and drilling water wells in Macuya.

FOOD SECURITY PROJECT IN RESGUARDO WACOYO

A project implemented with the indigenous community of Wacoyo (Puerto Gaitán, Meta, Colombia) to improve their agricultural practices while respecting their traditions, In it, we support them in the mechanization and preparation of the land, analysis of the most suitable crop for each plot from among 12 different species (bitter cassava, sweet cassava, chili, banana, etc.), and the delivery of seeds and fertilizer. With this initiative, we have impacted 561 families who own small plots of land, known as *conucos*, which total 141 hectares, cultivated with the intention of using 40% of the crop for self-consumption and the other 60% for sale.





CHILDREN AND YOUNG DREAM BUILDERS

In this project, we seek to help children and adolescents between the ages of 6 and 17 to lower the school dropout rate and improve their quality of life, as well as that of their families and teachers, while creating an opportunity for their participation in the local community. The project includes pedagogical, cultural, artistic, sports, and recreational activities that provide the participants with tools for building their individual life plan and a collective plan for the community, both from a human-rights perspective.

STRENGTHENING THE FARMERS' ASSOCIATION OF PRODUCERS OF PUERTO GAITÁN

The support process carried out in 2020 for the Acapropuga association allows us to promote a collaborative management model that characterizes the solidarity economy and to bring about achievements such as recognizing the role of each player in the development of their environment, generating awareness of the power of individual capabilities, taking advantage of the available resources to increase the productive potential, recognizing the value of working in coordination with different players, installing management skills, and raising awareness among the members of the importance of documenting their projects and expanding the number of partners to make their initiatives a reality.

3.2. THE ENVIRONMENT

The preservation of the environment is a fundamental area of activity for Fundación Cepsa. For this reason, we contribute to the conservation of natural environments and promote research projects and the recovery of different species in the areas in which Cepsa operates. In addition, we promote awareness among the public and schoolchildren of respect for nature and the promotion of initiatives that combine environmental intervention with support for groups at risk of exclusion.











We work to raise awareness and involve the public in environmental conservation through a variety of activities, especially aimed at schoolchildren, such as the Wetlands Day (in Huelva and Campo de Gibraltar), where 1,200 children visit an area of environmental value and take part

in workshops that invite them to learn about and respect their natural heritage. In schools in the Community of Madrid, we promote the collection of used oil for recycling by Afanias.

LAGUNA PRIMERA DE PALOS (HUELVA)

The lake belongs to the Natura 2000 Network and has been a Wetland of International Importance (Ramsar Area) since 2006. As an example of the good work done in this natural area, in 2020, 35 endangered bird species were observed, four of them considered "Critically Endangered": Brown Pochard (Aythya nyroca), Crested Coot (Fulica cristata), Common Tern (Chlidonias niger) and Crab Heron (Ardeola ralloides); and three considered "Endangered": Western marsh harrier (Circus aeroginosus), Morito (Plegadis falcinellus) and, as a breeder, the osprey (Pandion haliaetus).

MADREVIEJA ENVIRONMENTAL STATION (CAMPO DE GIBRALTAR)

In 2020, we continued our efforts to conserve and improve the biodiversity of the Madrevieja Environmental Station, where 21 species of mammals have been found, 139 species of birds have been sighted (with almost 300 birds banded), and 243 species of moths have been inventoried.

INVASIVE EXOTIC ALGAE

Within our line of work supporting scientific research projects, we should highlight the study with the Research Foundation of the University of Seville of the invasive exotic alga Rugulopteryx okamurae (Dictyotales, Ochrophyta), native to temperate areas of the northwest Pacific, which has expanded very aggressively in recent years along the Strait of Gibraltar with a serious impact on native biodiversity and created serious problems in the local economy (especially affecting the fishing sector and tourism).

S.O.S CARETTA: FISHERMEN FOR BIODIVERSITY

We are sponsoring this initiative, which aims at the conservation of sea turtles through collaboration with the fishing industry in the Gulf of Cadiz, by promoting training for the industry and involving it in the rescue of specimens, which are transported to land and then cared for by the Regional Government of Andalusia, a body that supports the project together with the Ministry for Ecological Transition and the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries, and Food, until they are returned to the sea. The project, coordinated by Hombre y Territorio, raises the awareness of the local population to the biodiversity of the marine environment, as well as the involvement of key players, such as the Port Authorities or the local authorities where the collaborating fishing organizations operate.







3.3. SCIENCE AND EDUCATION

We sponsor initiatives that enhance quality training in energy and technology-related subjects at all stages of education, paying special attention to university education and the professional vocations of women in science. We also work to improve the employability of young people in fields related to Cepsa's activity and support scientific research.









FUNDACIÓN CEPSA CHAIRS

A key element in our activity in the scientific and educational field are the five Chairs that the Fundación Cepsa has in collaboration with the universities of Cadiz, Seville,

Huelva, La Laguna, and the Polytechnic University of Madrid. With these five Chairs, we promote training, research, and innovation at the university level.













With some of these Chairs, our collaboration has been going on for years and, in 2020, we started regular meetings to promote cooperation between them as we seek to encourage contact and relations between the

Chairs' management so that they can share training programs, advances in research, relationship models between Cepsa professionals and university faculty, and the initiatives promoted by the different Chairs.

Of these five Chairs, the most recent is the Chair between Fundación Cepsa and the **University of La Laguna**. In 2020, we were able to undertake a large number of projects, such as starting a doctoral dissertation on the co-processing of oils and fats in the process of diesel hydrotreating, the student project TeideSat, the purpose of which is to design, build, and put into orbit a nanosatellite based on the CubeSat standard, and the LORA project, which introduces the Internet of Things (IoT) to university and high school students.

In 2020, we also put out the first call for entries for the Awards for the best Final Degree and Master's Degree projects, which recognize projects in which the subject matter is related to the field of the Chair, and we also promoted training activities such as a master class entitled "The neural network model applied to the industrial sector" and the conference "The challenge of digital transformation in the company".

In conjunction with the Fundación Cepsa Chair at the **University of Huelva,** we sponsored the "Sapere Aude" awards for undergraduate and master's degree final projects, the Alumnos 10C+ training program, a training cycle that aims to develop cross-cutting competencies such as ethics, teamwork, leadership, and personal skills, and a number of research initiatives with an industrial dissertation project with a doctoral student on the Cepsa staff.

With the Fundación Cepsa Chair at the **University of Cadiz**, we supported an industrial doctoral dissertation to determine the volatile and aromatic components in petroleum products through the use of an electronic nose, awards for articles, patents, and final projects that contribute to innovation in energy, petroleum, and environmental matters, and a course on the refining industry.

Through the Fundación Cepsa Chair at the School of Mining and Energy Engineering of the Polytechnic University of Madrid, we improved the training of university students with technical English classes, training in machine learning adapted to the oil industry, and the announcement of grants for students who spend part of their studies abroad. In 2020, we also launched the first call for proposals to encourage faculty and student research on topics of interest to Cepsa, and five projects involving five students and ten instructors were funded.

Through the Fundación Cepsa Chair at the **University of Seville,** we collaborated with awards for the best final projects in the fields of refining or petrochemicals, financial support for the ARUS team of university Formula 1 racing cars, and seminars given by Cepsa professionals on a variety of subjects.





SCIENTIFIC AND EDUCATIONAL PROJECTS



In addition to the collaborations with the Fundación Cepsa Chairs, in the educational scientific field, we implemented projects to bring schoolchildren closer to the world of energy and its uses in Campo de Gibraltar and Huelva with our "Energy Campus" and we also promoted initiatives to improve professional qualifications through our collaborations with the FUNSEAM Foundation for Energy and Environmental Sustainability and the Spanish Royal Society of Chemistry.

COLLABORATION WITH INSPIRING GIRLS

With this new partnership, we are seeking to promote scientific and technological vocations among young girls and teenage girls. Since the proportion of women in many scientific fields is still very low, we partnered with Inspiring Girls to promote the inclusion of women in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics)

careers through a first group of more than 50 female employees who volunteered to share their personal and professional experiences with girls and encourage them to choose careers related with these academic disciplines, as well as to help eliminate prejudices against the inclusion of women in these professional fields.

COMFUTURO, WITH FUNDACIÓN GENERAL CSIC

In 2020, we continued our collaboration with Fundación General CSIC as partners in the ComFuturo program, which seeks to attract and retain young research talent so as to address the unemployment of highly qualified young scientists by directing their research towards environmental sustainability. In our three-year partnership, we have supported Dr. Ana Belén Dongil«s research into "New graphene materials for the synthesis of methanol from CO2 and H2".


